Weather and Nesting Success in Whooping Cranes The whooping crane has long been in danger of becoming an extinct species. Its population has been carefully studied by the Canadian Wildlife Service since its breeding grounds in Wood Buffalo National Park were discovered in 1954. The whooping crane migrates north from the Aransas Refuge in Texas.

Adult whooping cranes' black wing tips are visible during flight. The species can stand over 1.5 meters (5 feet), males weigh about 7.0 kg (17 lb), while females weigh about 6.0 kg (14 lb). The taiga in Wood Buffalo National Park, Alberta, Canada, was the last remnant of the former nesting habitat of the Whooping Crane.

When the weather is good and the winds favorable, a migrating Whooping Crane flies like a glider, on fixed wings. The bird spirals upwards (aided by thermal activity), glides down, dropping as low as 70 meters above ground, and then begins spiraling upward again.
